


Wildlife Images Camp EEK!
Communicable Disease
Management Plan

Created: May 20, 2020



This plan includes protocols to notify the Local Public Health Authority (LPHA) of any confirmed COVID-19 cases among campers or staff; a process and record keeping to assist the LPHA as needed with contact tracing; a protocol for screening campers and staff for symptoms; a protocol to restrict from camp any ill or exposed persons; and possible cessation of camp activities.

Daily Logs:

In order to support contact tracing of cases if necessary, daily logs will be kept. This log will be maintained for a minimum of 4 weeks after completion of the camp. Daily logs shall include:

- Child name
- Drop off/pick up time
- Adult completing both drop off/pick up
- Adult emergency contact information
- All staff that interact with stable group of children (including floater staff)

In addition, registration paperwork from campers must contain contact information for all campers and staff.

- Any camper or staff known to have been exposed (e.g., by a household member) to COVID-19 within the preceding 14 days will be restricted from camp.
- Staff will be advised not to work if they or anyone in their household have recently had an illness with fever or a new cough. They will be asked to remain home for at least 10 days after illness onset and until 72 hours after fever is gone, without use of fever reducing medicine, and COVID-19 symptoms (fever, cough, shortness of breath, and diarrhea) are improving. Staff who have a cough that is not a new onset cough (e.g. asthma, allergies, etc.), do not need to be excluded from camp. Staff with existing conditions that cause cough will be noted on records.
- Parents of campers will be advised not to bring their child if they or anyone in their household have recently had an illness with fever or a new cough. They will be asked to remain home for at least 10 days after illness onset and until 72 hours after fever is gone, without use of fever reducing medicine, and COVID-19 symptoms (fever, cough,

shortness of breath, and diarrhea) are improving. Campers who have a cough that is not a new onset cough (e.g. asthma, allergies, etc.), do not need to be excluded from camp. Campers with existing conditions that cause cough will be noted on registration forms and drop off logs.

- If anyone who has entered camp is diagnosed with COVID-19, we will report to and consult with the LPHA regarding cleaning and possible classroom or program closure.
- We will report to the LPHA any cluster of illness among the summer camp staff or students.
- We will frequently remind all staff and parents to keep themselves and their children home with any illness involving fever, new cough, or shortness of breath.
- We will provide handwashing stations, tissues and garbage receptacles that are easily accessible to both children and staff.
- All persons in the camp will be advised and encouraged to wash their hands frequently (e.g., after using the restroom, before and after meals, after coming inside, after sneezing, blowing the nose, or coughing) with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Except when eating, preparing, or serving food and after using the restroom, alcohol-based hand-sanitizing products (60 to 95%) may be used as an alternative to handwashing. If soap and water are not feasible (e.g., Mountain Lion Meadows), alcohol-based hand sanitizing products may be used; however, every effort will be made to facilitate soap and water handwashing. Hand sanitizer will be stored out of reach of students younger than 5 years of age when not in use.
- Staff and campers will be reminded frequently of the importance of respiratory etiquette as outlined below:
 - Cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue or elbow;
 - Throw any used tissue away immediately into a garbage receptacle; and
 - Clean hands after covering coughs and sneezes, and after throwing away used tissues.
- Children over the age of 2 may wear a face mask if under close adult supervision.
- Children of any age should not wear a face covering:
 - If they have a medical condition that makes it difficult for them to breath with a face covering;
 - If they have a disability that prevents them from wearing a face covering;
 - If they are unable to remove the face covering independently; or
 - While sleeping.
- Face coverings will not be required for children and should never prohibit or prevent access to instruction or activities.
- To minimize contact during drop-off and pick-up, parents will be allowed to remain outside of the building for sign-in and sign-out of their children.

Screening for Symptoms:

- We will check for new cough and fever daily upon sign-in. If a parent will not allow this, they must verbally attest to temperature. Individuals with a fever greater than or equal to 100.4 degrees F should not be allowed to enter.

- If a camper or a staff member develops a new cough (e.g., unrelated to pre-existing condition such as asthma), fever, shortness of breath, or other symptoms of COVID-19 during the camp day, they will be isolated away from others immediately and sent home as soon as possible.
 - While waiting for a sick child to be picked up, a staff member will stay with the child in an area or room isolated from others. The staff member should remain as far away as safely possible from the child (preferably at least 6 feet), while remaining in the same area/room.
 - The affected individual should remain home for at least 10 days after illness onset and until 72 hours after fever is gone, without use of fever reducing medicine, and COVID-19 symptoms (fever, cough, shortness of breath, and diarrhea) are improving.
- We will ensure that the camp has flexible sick-leave and absentee policies that discourage staff from reporting to work while sick.
- If anyone who has entered the camp facility is diagnosed with COVID-19, we will report to and consult with the local public health authority regarding any potential need for closure.

Physical Distancing:

Camp will be limited to a maximum stable group of 10 or fewer children (“stable” means the same 10 or fewer children in the group each day).

- The stable group will not change more frequently than once per week.
- Stable cohorts will consist of campers and staff; the number of staff needed/necessary for a cohort does not count to the total of 10. Staff will remain with a single cohort as much as is practical and feasible.
- Camp will ensure that each stable group remains in the same indoor physical space each day.
- The number of staff interacting with each group of children will be minimized; staff will be dedicated to a single group. “Floater staff” will sanitize their hands prior to entering the space with the stable group of children.
- Staff will wear face coverings.
- If guest speakers come in, they will sanitize their hands on entering and exiting and wear face coverings.
- Daily activities and curriculum will support physical distancing, striving to maintain at least 6 feet between individuals.
 - We will increase the distance between children during table work.
 - We will plan activities that do not require close physical contact among multiple campers.
 - We will designate equipment (e.g., art supplies, crayons, pencils, balls, mitts, etc.) solely for the use by a single cohort and sanitize between uses. If equipment must be shared between cohorts, it will be sanitized before and after each use by a stable cohort.

- We will minimize time standing in lines and take steps to ensure that 6 feet of distance between the campers is maintained.
- We will restrict non-essential visitors and volunteers.
- Parents or other visitors may only come to camp for special events (e.g. awards, presentations, etc.) if 6 feet distancing between all persons can be maintained. Visitors should wear face coverings and sanitize their hands when they enter.

Intensify Cleaning, Disinfection, and Ventilation:

- We will clean, sanitize, and disinfect frequently touched surfaces (for example, door handles, sink handles, gate handles, etc) multiple times per day.
- We will avoid use of items that are not easily cleaned, sanitized, or disinfected.
- We will ensure safe and correct application of disinfectants and keep these products away from children following labeling direction as specified by the manufacturer.
- We will ensure that ventilation systems operate properly and increase circulation of outdoor air as much as possible by opening windows and doors, using fans, and other methods.
 - We will not open windows or doors if doing so poses a safety or health risk (for example, allowing pollen in or exacerbating asthma symptoms) to children using the facility.

Food Service:

- Campers and staff will wash hands with soap and water prior to eating.
- Campers will bring their own food.
- Campers will be instructed not to share food with other campers.
